

BREMERHAVEN, West Germany (UPI) - Three Americanmade Hawk anti-aircraft missiles exploded on a launching pad Wednesday night, killing two West German soldiers and injuring three others, the defense ministry announced.

The ministry refused to speculate on the possibility of sabotage and said police and government agents were investigating the cause of the explosions at the German army's munitions depot at Krempel, about 55 miles north of Bremerhaven.

### Cosmonauts finish space mission

MOSCOW (UPI) - Two Soviet cosmonauts completed a week-long mission in space Wednesday and made final. preparations for a return to Earth.

The official Tass news agency said Col. Valery Bykovsky, 42, and Vladimir Aksenov, 41, transfered from the working area of their Soyuz 22 spacecraft to the ship's tiny descent module.

The cosmonauts carried film, log books and other "reasearch material" to the capsule and "performed a trial switch-on of the propulsion unit," Tass said.

Tass said the fianl work of the mission was a biological experiment involving "the phenomenon of light effects that are caused by cosmic ray particles in the light sensitive cells of the eye.

#### Britain optimistic on Rhodesia

LONDON (UPI) - Britain Wednesday abandoned earlier pessimism about a peaceful turnover of power to blacks in Rhodesia, saying for the first time there appears to be "a really good chance" of a settlement.

If a peaceful change is accomplished, it will be largely due to Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's week of African shuttle diplomacy, Foreign Secretary Anthony Crosland said.

Crosland's sudden optimism contrasted sharply with statements put out by Foreign Office officials earlier this week.

#### Coup d'etat plan discovered

JAKARTA, Indonesia (UPI) - The Indonesian government announced Wednesday the discovery of a plot to oust President Suharto and replace him with former Vice President Mohammed Hatta.

The announcement, made by the state executive secretary after a meeting between Suharto and leaders of the nation's top state institutions, said there were "indications" of such a plot in two seized documents.
