HE IS A PRETTY VILLAIN

A Man with Many Aliases in Prison in New York.

CHARGED WITH ABDUCTION

His Career of Crime Extends Over Years and Over a Large Part of the Country—Arrested Over One Hundred Times.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—Sylvester F. Wilson, or Christian Wilson, or W. S. Franklin, manager of female baseballists, is behind the bars of the Harlem police court prison charged with abducting Lydia Sunderland.

He is a Smooth Talker. Wilson is about forty years of age. He is a big man with broad shoulders and an imposing appearance.

Over thirty years ago he was adopted into the family of the Rev. Hugh Atkinson, a struggling minister in the small town of Humboldt, Neb.

Beginning His Career. Then began a career of offenses against every law. In 1873 Wilson was arrested in Cincinnati for sending an obscene paper through the mails.

That he made money there can be no doubt, but he also had a great deal of difficulty in keeping out of jail.

His Last Victim. His last victim, Lydia Sunderland, is bright, pretty and smart. She said that she was glad that Mr. Gerry's society had got her, for she wanted to be good again.

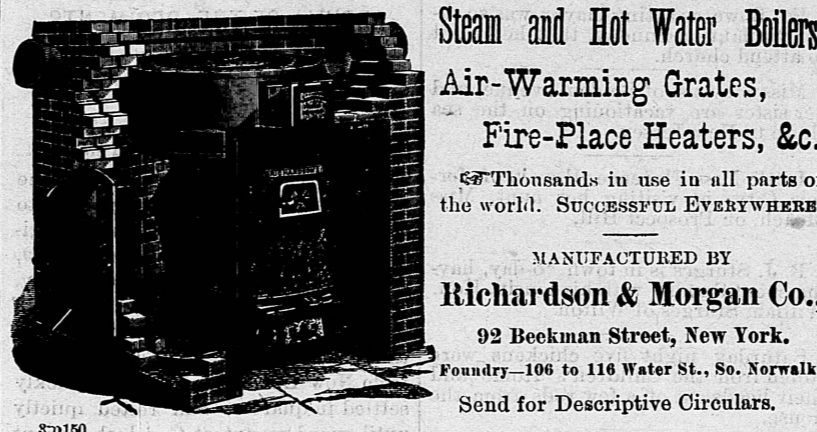
