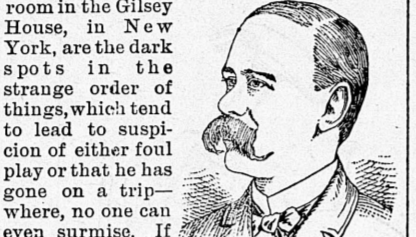

JAY GOULD'S CONDITION. Conflicting Reports About the Health of the Wall Street Magnate. NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Alarming reports published concerning Jay Gould's health had it that at the meeting of the Missouri Pacific directors Wednesday Mr. Gould broke down, became incoherent in his utterances and suddenly burst into tears.

Regarding the story of Mr. Gould's ill health it was said that Mr. Gould had been at his office every day this week until Friday, and that he was there when there was no special necessity for his being there.

CIVIL WAR IN TANNA. Two Villages Wiped Out by the Strife and a Cyclone Sweeps the Island. SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 3.—Advises by steamship Monowai say that the island of Tanna has been visited by a hurricane and devastated by a civil war.

Three Men Instantly Killed. LEONISTER, Mass., Oct. 3.—Fred Miller, a slater, of Grafton; Simon Warden, a stable keeper; George Quint, a barber, and John Gallagher, a barber, were killed in turning from the Peppercorn cattle show in horses.

Hanged by Masked Men. BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 3.—Masked white men visited the house of John Brown, a well-to-do negro farmer, near Childersburg, Ala., and carried him off in a private car.

Serious Row at a Circus. TENNESSEE, Ill., Oct. 3.—At E. C. Rogers' show an employee got into a row with Allan James. James stabbed the show man, who will die.

Attempted Murder and Suicide. FREMONT, O., Oct. 3.—Joseph Hobe, a German, from Toledo, made an attempt to murder his wife, who had left him and was living in this city.

Monbars Breaks His Own Record. RICHMOND, Ind., Oct. 3.—Monbars made a successful attempt to beat his own 2-year-old stallion record. He was driven a very even mile by Buddy Doble, the quarters being made in 3:44, 1:08, 1:44, 2:18, Nelson failed to break his record, his mile being made in 2:11 1/2.

Mrs. Harrison's Movements. BOSTON, Oct. 3.—Mrs. Harrison and Mrs. McKee were the guests of ex-Governor Oliver Ames at Easton. They returned to Amundrade after luncheon with the family and visiting the points of interest in the town.

SAMOA HAD A REVOLT. The Uprising Quickly Subdued and No Further Trouble Is Feared. 'T'WAS A WAR AMONG CHIEFS. The Ringleaders Arrested and Imprisoned—Malafa Is Still Treated as King and He Is Inclined to Be Restless. A Mixed State of Affairs.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 3.—Advice from Apia, Samoa, under date of Sept. 16 say: Natives on the island of Monoa have been trying for some time to upset the present government, and a few weeks ago some of the chiefs who expressed their intention of going to Mulinuu to join the government had their houses pulled down and their plantations destroyed by order of the other chiefs.

Mataafa Still King. Mataafa is still at Malie with about 300 men, and is treated as king. He is keeping the country in a state of unrest. A story has been circulated that the United States would help in the event of war, and this has had the effect of keeping a number of discontented chiefs about Mataafa.

Chief Justice Cedarkrantz gives great dissatisfaction here. He has limited knowledge of the English language, and cannot conduct supreme court cases or transact ordinary government business. He refuses to have anything to do with the governing country, and although he has been nine months in Samoa he has not framed a single law for the guidance of the Samoan magistrates.

Could Not Coerce the Government. The German land commissioner and English consul say that if the chief justice does not pay, neither will they, on the ground that they are representatives of foreign powers. There is nothing in the treaty to show that the government officials should be allowed this privilege.

Munro's Yacht Disabled. BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Oct. 3.—Norman Munro's steam yacht Norwood ran upon Penfield reef, off this harbor, and one of the blades of her propeller was twisted. The Norwood put into this harbor for repairs and is still tied up here.

Serious for North Dakota. JAMESTOWN, Oct. 3.—All over North Dakota there is disappointment. The big crops are lying in the fields about as they were tossed from the binders. Rain has been pouring steadily on the unprotected crop for the last twenty-four hours.

Assassin Fitzsimmons Heard From. PITTSBURG, Oct. 3.—The murderer Fitzsimmons, who shot Detective Gilkins and who recently escaped from the county jail here, was heard from yesterday. He sent \$1,000 to his attorney, Thomas M. Marshall, to obtain a new trial for his wife, who was indicted with him, and, after his escape, found guilty of murder in the second degree.

Jewelry Thieves Jailed. NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Robert Howe and Nellie Hanburg, convicted of stealing jewelry, valued \$7,000, from Carl Werneck, were sentenced. Howe was sent to state prison for eight years and six months, and the woman to five years and six months.
