#### Abstract

In Washington vitrifed brick as a pavement in the pablicly traveled streets and avenues have been thor oughly tested and found to stand the mear and tear of the iron tires of car- riages and heavy tracks, even better that granite blocks. In New Haven a particalarly severe test has been given these vitrified bricks as a paving material near to: th outside and between the iron rails of their street car tracks. At the corner of Ohapel and State streets in the latter city, these brick pavings have been down for three years and are found to be tougher and firmer of fibre than are stone blooks. They are a specially hard to chipping off or crumbling, as in the case of Belgian blocks or other stone paving.
