## Concrete Perch

Once upon a time (ten days ago) the Town of Somers was a peaceful community in northwest Tolland County, inhabited by 4,000 largely law-abiding citizens, and composed of real estate properties valued in the town's 1962 Grand List at \$10,238,541. All that changed dramatically on Nov. 5 when in a one-day population explosion the town admitted some 1,200 new residents. More than two-thirds of the newcomers are prisoners; the remaining third are hired to see that they remain prisoners. The buildings housing the newcomers are worth close to twice the assessed value of all the rest of the town—and have been referred to by the prisoners themselves as a "hotel." Keeping an eye on this high-priced resort are the correction officers (they're not called "guards" anymore) stationed in the poured-concrete watchtowers on the far corners of the prison. There, with the aid of electronic sensors in the high, chain-link fence, these men can keep a crow's-nest vigil for signs of those who have a yen to check out. 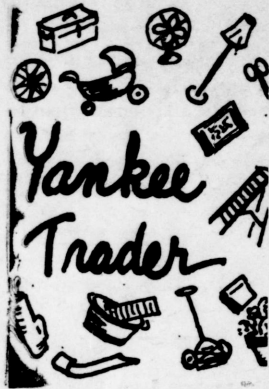

## Outfitting The Space Men

Northern Connecticut employees of Hamilton Standard division of United Aircraft may feel they are directly contributing to the future conquest of space. Photo left shows prototypes of the space suit and life-supporting back pack being developed at Hamilton for the Apollo moon-landing program, and which have been delivered to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's spacecraft center at Houston, Texas. Rubber bellows at the joints of arms, legs, and torso provide mobility when the suit is pressurized. The helmet has an airlock feeding device which can be used for eating and drinking in the weightless conditions of space as well as on the moon. The pack supplies oxygen and ventilation, controls temperature and humidity. It is designed for four-hour expeditions on the moon or in space.

# HERITAGE ROAD

## Some Diamonds In The Rough

Ninety-one years ago — on Nov. 10, 1872 — a rugged young geologist named Clarence King uncovered a fantastic fraud. It had fooled a dozen hard-headed bankers—who were confidently planning to make huge profits.

The men who did the fooling escaped. Here's what happened:

In February, 1872, two grubby-looking miners appeared in San Francisco. Their actions were furtive. They seemed to trust no one. Finally they deposited a large

sack in a bank belonging to William C. Ralston, a dignified member of the city's aristocracy. Ralston couldn't resist a peek in the sack. What he saw made his eyes pop.

The sack was crammed with uncut diamonds, rubies, sapphires, and emeralds!

Ralston wasted no time in winning the confidence of the miners. He wined and dined them. Hesitantly, they re-

vealed that they had found a fabulous mine in the wastes of Arizona. (They refused to say exactly where). With great tact, Ralston told them that, ignorant of the world of business as they were, they would be cheated if they didn't tie in with a responsible group. He would be delighted to set up a corporation that would safely exploit their discovery and make fortunes for all of them.

The miners, whose names were Arnold and Slack,

agreed. They seemed relieved to have fallen in with honest men.

Elated, Ralston went to work. He persuaded a number of bankers to invest thousands of dollars in a company to exploit the mine. He negotiated secretly, but word leaked out. Within a few days he had to turn down 15 offers of over \$200,000 for the mine. Meanwhile word came back from Tiffany's in New York that the rocks brought out by Arnold and

Slack were worth about \$150,000.

The electric hint of fabulous riches floated in the air. Ralston had no trouble lining up Civil War General George McClellan and famous consulting engineer Henry Janin for his outfit. The directors decided to issue capital stock of \$10,000,000. Janin made a trip to the mine (after being blindfolded by the still-cautious miners). He reported incredible findings. Within a

(Continued from Page 4) few minutes after having his blindfold removed he dug up a gem-stone. Diamonds, rubies, sapphires lay in crevices and under boulders. "If I hadn't gone through it all myself," he reported, "I should hardly believe it." Westerners got set for a new rush of prospectors. Only one man seemed skeptical — Clarence King. King had made a geological survey along the transcontinental railroad. He was positive that gem-stones of this type could not have originated in the area. By careful sleuthing — including poring over maps that showed landmarks similar to those

described by Janin — he decided that the "mine" was at Table Rock, Utah. He and his aide took a trip there. He found the gem-stones. They were tucked in holes, buried under slabs — just as Arnold and Slack had said. But King noticed telltale scratches on them, as if they had been poked underground with rods. He even found one partially - polished diamond. The area had been "salted" with rough stones. His report burst the speculative bubble. Arnold and Slack had already sold out their share for \$300,000 apiece and fled. Stockholders descended on Ralston in rage. He paid off all that he could,

draining his personal wealth. How did Arnold and Slack pull so slick a swindle? They had imported \$25,000 worth of inferior, uncut stones from Amsterdam, the gem capital of the world. Americans, even Tiffany jewelers, were not used to seeing them in this form. Awe-struck, they overestimated their value. Rumor and exaggeration did the rest. Slack vanished forever. Ralston was found dead in San Francisco Bay after his bank collapsed. Arnold was shot to death in Kentucky while setting up a business with his ill-gotten loot.

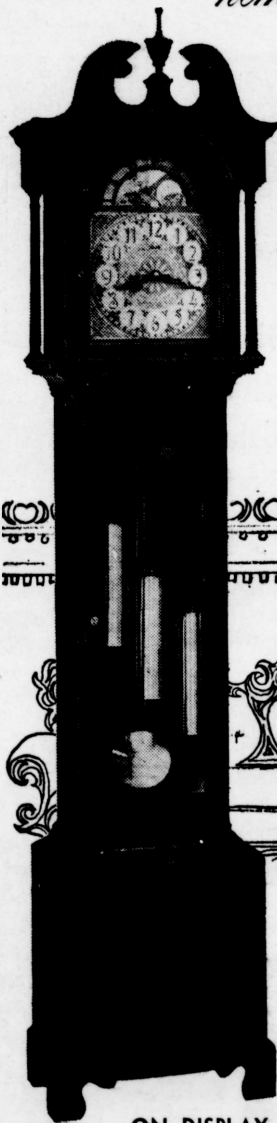


## Four-Town Youth Order Installs

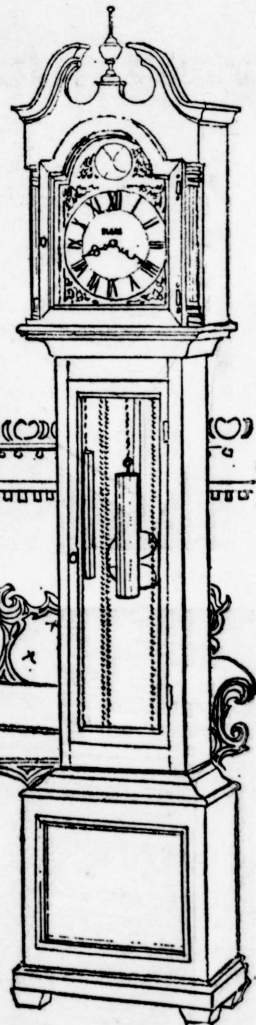

**Fort Dix Was Never Like This**

 Touring the swanky new State Prison in Somers last week, just an hour before busloads of prisoners began arriving, I couldn't help but conclude that — unless some startling changes have been made in the last dozen years — an armed robber in Somers, Conn., lives in considerably greater comfort than a new shavetail (second lieutenant) at Fort Dix, N.J.  
 For instance: earphones and piped-in AM-FM music at

each bed, a TV recreation room as large as a gymnasium, and two gymnasiums including boxing ring and handball courts, a four-floor hospital including dental facilities with the most up-to-date water-cooled drills, library and classroom facilities which put the average high school to shame, and movies every Saturday night.  
 As far as privacy goes, I would have to give Fort Dix the edge. Prison latrines, like Army latrines, are communal

affairs — but in the Army they don't put glass windows in the latrine doors. The latest plumbing fixtures are in evidence in the \$20 million prison — but the toilets are seatless and the sinks have push-button faucets. The idea being that unhappy prisoners have been known to rip apart anything that isn't secured.  
 No foxhole-digging at Somers Prison. The men pass the time of day working in one of their well-lighted, well-equipped "industries." They do printing, furniture renovating, typewriter repairing, sign making, laundering and cleaning, and they operate a

clothing factory. Rate of pay, on the best jobs: two to five cents an hour.  
 If an industry worker acts up, his job is taken away and he's put in a "segregation unit." (They used to call it "solitary.") "Working is a privilege," the prison's Director of Industries told us. "There aren't very many men who prefer to stay in a cell all day."  
 There are no "segregation units" at Fort Dix. All units are integrated. And there's another difference between the two institutions: None of the inmates at Somers is punished by being assigned to guard duty.

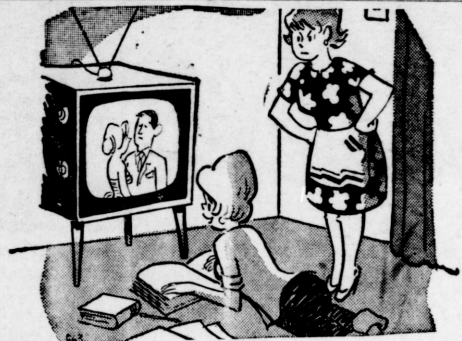

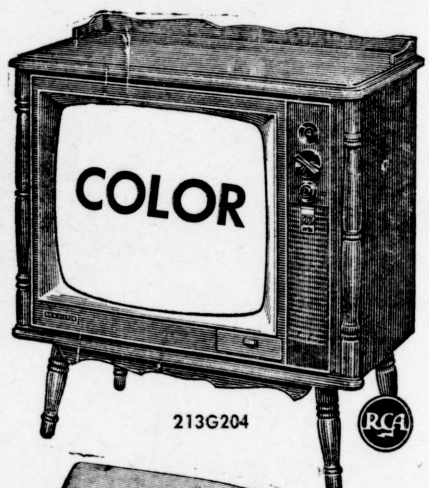

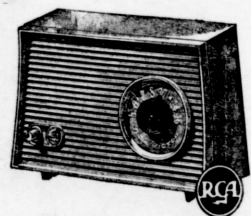

# All to the Good

by U. S. Senator Abe Ribicoff



There was a good deal of noise and confusion in the Cabinet Room at the White House. In front of President Kennedy, as he sat at the head of the table, were about 40 members of the Washing-

ton press corps — reporters taking notes, photographers snapping pictures, television crews grinding away. In back were some 40 more people — Congressional leaders, men and women from the Execu-

tive branch, and health leaders like Connecticut's own Deputy Health Commissioner Bert Schmickel.

Everyone present had an overwhelming interest in common: the cause of the nation's 15-20 million people who live in families where there is a mentally retarded man, woman or child. The occasion was the signing of H. R. 7544 — the Maternal and Child Health and Mental Retardation Planning Amendments of 1963.

As is usual at such ceremonies, the President used a good many pens to sign his name to the bill. In fact he tied President Truman's record — 26! He took each one from a penholder in front of him and scratched one part of each letter of his name with each pen.

"It gives me great pleasure to approve this bill, the Mills-Ribicoff bill," he said,

and, as is customary, he then distributed the pens he had just used to those most intimately involved in the legislation signed. Turning to me, he offered me the first pen, but I passed it on to Congressman Wilbur Mills of Arkansas, my senior colleague in this matter. The President's sister, Mrs. Sargent Shriver, a consultant to the President's Committee on Mental Retardation, got another. I'll treasure the one I received because it signed the first bill bearing my name to become law since I was elected to the Senate. It couldn't be in a better cause.

It was a very satisfying day for me. As many of you know, I have long been interested in the problems of the mentally retarded. As Governor of Connecticut, I did everything I could to help them, and their families. These families are a very fine

group of people, self-reliant, imaginative and courageous. What help they get from their government is magnified a hundredfold by their own perseverance and initiative. Now this new bill, which I had the honor to sponsor in the Senate, will give their cause a big boost. It will initiate a new program of comprehensive maternity and infant care, aimed directly at preventing mental retardation — especially in the lower income groups where it is most prevalent. And it will help arouse local communities to a major attack on the problems of mental retardation.

After the signing ceremonies, I went with the President to the Mayflower Hotel to the 13th Annual Convention of the National Association for Retarded Children. He gave a fine speech to this group. But I think he'd be the first to admit he was upstaged.

The real stars of the show were 13 Connecticut youngsters. These retarded boys, members of the Mansfield State Training School Band, were flown to Washington in a private plane provided for them by Mrs. Shriver. Though they started out at 7:30 a. m., they were delayed by fog. But it didn't matter. When they arrived, they swung right into "When the Saints Come Marching In," and their next arrangement, "Was Your Mother Born in Ireland — Cha, Cha, Cha," brought down the house.

I had the honor of introducing them and their band-leader, Joseph Romeo, to the crowd. We were all very moved by their performance. It showed what every child can do — given the proper opportunity — to live up to the very limits of his ability. I'm proud that the Mills-Ribicoff bill will help give more children such fine opportunities.
