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Biting Pastime

Ice Fishing Hot Sport If Inner Man Equipped

Ice fishing, described as a "cold" sport by Earl Provencher, of South Rd, Somers, can be warmed up quite a bit, he says, if the necessary supplies are provided for the inner as well as the outer man.

Among the essential equipment, Provencher includes ski parkas, face masks, boots, wool socks, and - turning inward-thermal underwear and an occasional swallow of tea or spirits.

The fish was thrown back as the minimum size is 15 inches.

The technique is to drill holes with an ice auger, then lower a "tipup" (a mechanical device attached to a fishing reel). Colored flags are connected to the top of the reel and as soon as there is a bite, the flag waves-sign for the fisherman to pull up his catch.

Sometimes, to liven things up, Provencher relates, fellow fishermen will tie a beer can to a "tip-up" of a fellow fisherman while he is busy with something else. This usually results in an energetic waving of the flag, leading the owner of the tip-up to believe he has a bite, rush over to the hole, pull up the reel-and x&*!\$#%!!!
