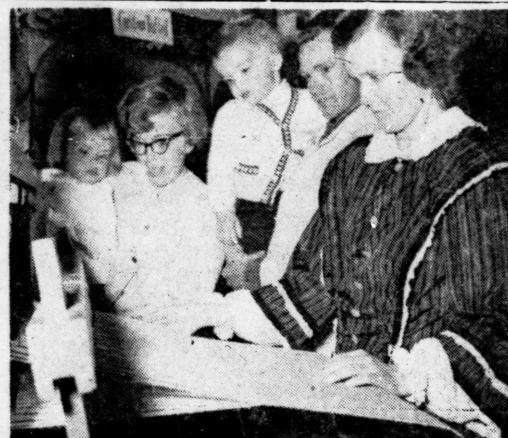

Enfield's First Industrial Exhibition Was A Family Affair — And Many Of The Youthful Visitors Came To The Surprising Conclusion That

Industry Is Fun

Nearly 6,000 people from in and around Enfield kept National Guardsmen busy directing traffic at the new Enfield Armory May 7-9 as the Enfield Jaycees and Chamber of Commerce staged the first industrial exhibition ever held in Northern Connecticut. The idea was to show the world that Enfield welcomes industry — and to give the residents of this area a better appreciation of products produced locally. Exhibitors ranged from small machine-tool and plastics plants to such "name" firms as U.S. Envelope, Bigelow Sanford and Hallmark Cards. There was a bevy of prizes, and in the picture at above left, exhibition vice-chairman W. Lindsey Booth, CL&P division manager, is announcing the winner of \$500 worth of Bigelow carpeting, donated by Faber's World of Carpets. While exhibition committee members tried to decipher the handwriting of the winner, Booth stretched his arms and said, "We're having trouble reading it, but if your name isn't this long you didn't win!" (The name — John Kukulka, age 12, of 12 Colony Rd. — wasn't so long after all.) In photo at lower left, Robert Brown of the Southern New England Telephone Co. describes some of his company's latest equipment to 10-year-old Ellen Kazukynas of 54 Wilstarr Cir., Hazardville. One of the major attention-getters at the exhibition was the Bigelow Sanford display, where (photo above) carpeting of the 1880's was exhibited and where Stella Bajek, in period costume, demonstrated the art of carpet weaving on an antique loom. 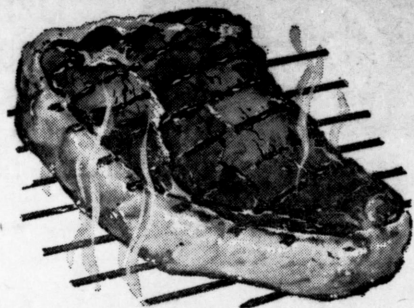

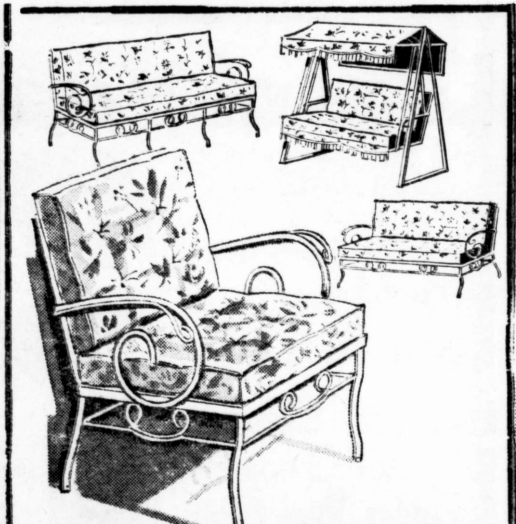

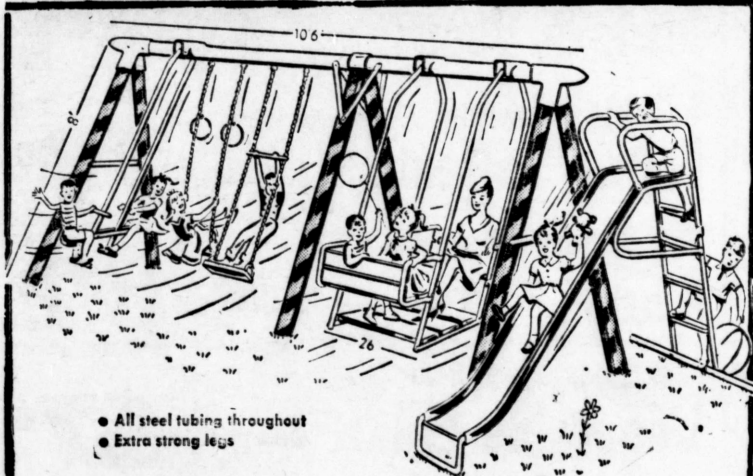

But she said she would tell sis to come over to see me, instead, and perhaps bring my new niece and namesake. Anyway, by that time, the numbness was beginning to wear off and I didn't feel like going anywhere at all!

Nowadays a doctor wouldn't think of performing an operation like that in the home! Suppose it had been one of those bleeding cases, or I hadn't taken the anesthetic well, or a dozen other what-ifs that could have happened! I didn't have to be operated on again for anything for some 35 years, and then I went to the hospital for an appendectomy. I am not sure that today's doctors would know how to go about doing an operation like that in a home! At least no well-instructed city doctor would. There probably are still some country doctors who could do it and who keep their bags supplied with the means to perform emergency home operations. But do you know what? I'll bet Dr. Palomba of Somers could!

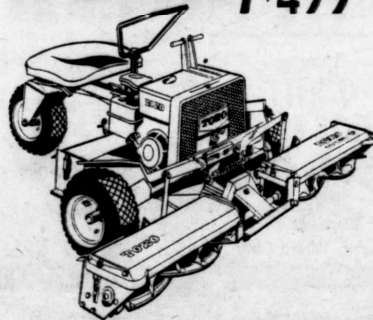
