1885 IN NORWALK. BOILED DOWN FROM THE GAZETTE OF EACH WEEK. January 6th.—Hotel Brunswick formally opened by the new management, Murphy and Rogers.

13th.—Series of benefit entertainments in Brooklyn for the Norwalk strikers. Installation of Buckingham Post officers. James L. Griffin, in Marlborough.

20th.—Two children of Sanford Smith died of membranous croup. South Norwalk bridge closed. Rufus Finney, of Norwalk, died in Bridgeport.

27th.—Death of Brooklyn of Timothy T. Merwin, a former Norwalk lawyer and editor of the GAZETTE. Death by explosion of the McDonald sisters, and death of Mrs. Eunice W. Rogers and little Mattie Parker.

February 8th.—Norwalk Uniformed Degree Camp, I. O. O. F., organized. Building of the Roton Post, organized. Petitions sent in for harbor beacon. Supt. Crawford had a fainting fit on the train.

March 8th.—Death of Dr. J. C. Witch. Mrs. Gregory-Pillow died. Sheriff Swartz takes twelve jailbirds to Bridgeport. Annual meeting of the Norwalk Forks.

17th.—Eclipse of the sun. Surprise party celebration of Silas T. Tingley's birthday. The new committee of ladies' officers in consultation, with a view of effecting a settlement of difficulties.

24th.—Mrs. Weed and Miss Sellick start on an extended southern trip. "Doc" Wilson, boarding house keeper, moves to Brooklyn. The "Thomas" has a fire in the harbor and was rescued by passers-by.

April 7th.—William A. Batterson, aged 90, hung himself to a beam in an out-house. Mrs. Amanda Raymond Smith died. Mrs. J. H. Phillips fell through a cattle guard.

21st.—Opening of the schools for summer terms. Danbury & Norwalk depots equipped with stretchers for the accommodation of dead folks.

10th.—"Housewarming" at the Congressional parsonage. Capt. Sandy Knapp has a fit in the street. A collision throws a hit from "Widger's" carriage.

14th.—Charles M. Lockwood, flagman, killed by a car on the Washington street crossing. Dr. Newman's funeral in the Roton Post.

17th.—Lock shop destroyed by fire. The Masonic lodge held a sewing machine in Faucher & Ruscoe's shoe factory.

18th.—Death of William P. Wood in Hudson. Dr. George C. Buddington, of Norwalk, died in New York. Extensive improvements at the Court House.

25th.—The borough water shut off and a water panic precipitated by the mismanagement of the water board. Mrs. Wm. A. Kellogg died.

28th.—Town and borough caucuses. Fredman's claim barked at Dorlon's Post. Robert Roberts, of East Norwalk, shot and injured by a policeman.

30th.—Beyers' mill at the fair grounds. Bread broke through the ice in the harbor and was rescued by passers-by.

14th.—Marriage of Mary Hanford Woodward to Arthur G. Earle. Three thousand barrels of oysters shipped from South Norwalk in one week.

19th.—The sewer scheme defeated in town meeting. Lamburn road machine to be purchased. Suicide in New York of J. W. Raymond, formerly of New Canaan.

20th.—Death of E. O. Olmstead from injuries received in being thrown from a wagon. Bunken coal barges in the harbor raised by a wrecking boat.

23d.—Death of Ebenezer P. Harvey, resulting from a fall. Fairfield County editors have a square meal at Acker's, Roton Post.

24th.—The Hayt divorce suit settled. Shocking runaway with collation. Mrs. Lizzie Smith sent to jail for 30 days for being drunk.

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Scientific.

M. Damiela Muller attributes the whirlwinds coming from two opposite directions, and traces a close analogy between them and the eddies produced in streams by similar causes.

M. Charles Richet has given the results of his study of the physiological action of the salts of rubidium. Subcutaneous injections of the chloride of rubidium applied to frogs, fishes, rabbits, guinea pigs, and pigeons show that this metal has the same toxic effect as potassium, but somewhat less violent.

The German Society of Mechanical Engineers offer a premium of 1,000 marks for the best plan for a boiler shop in which 10 locomotive boilers can be constructed at once; also a premium of 800 marks for an essay on the best method, according to present experience, for fastening tires on railroad rolling stock.

Special arrangements, M. J. Jansson reports, have been made at the Mendon Observatory for the study of the hydrogen, oxygen, and other substances present in the terrestrial atmosphere.

The investigations of MM. W. Spring and H. Tress of the Royal Academy of Sciences are interesting, but the results are only just what might have reasonably been anticipated.
