HIS ARGUMENT.
There wasn't the diff. difficulty in making them believe, either. I think we could have raised \$200,000 capital if there had been need of it. The trouble was to get capitalists and speculators on.

We had a fine run to Honolulu, and returned without a penny more than we had when we started. We had to make some good repairs and lay in more provisions and water. Capt. Wheaton there met a fellow captain named Bridges, who was a New Bedford whaler, and without a suspicion of what he was doing this man greatly discouraged us.

At the end of the fortnight the fine weather was broken by a rough sea, which was a warning up during my night watch, and all hands had to be called. We had a hard time of it during the hour, and it was while we were being blown by the wind that the captain was washed overboard by a heavy sea which we thought would be the end of us.

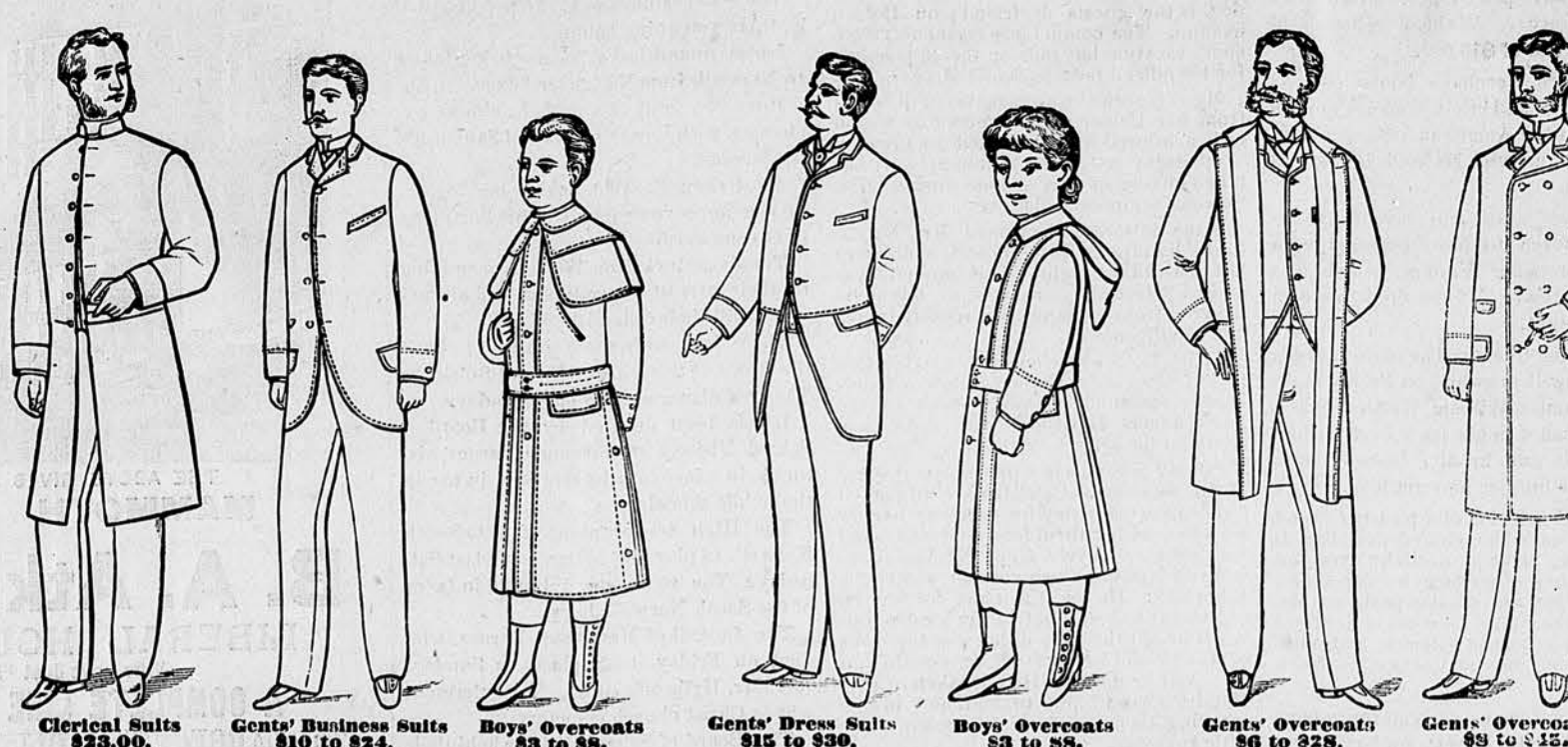
