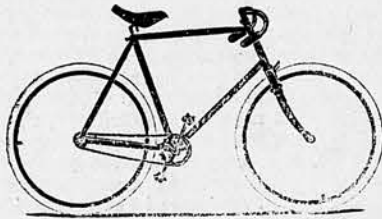

FORGERY ALLEGED.

W. W. Keyes Missing Under Peculiar Circumstances.

Judge Andrew Selleck's Name Said to Have Been Forged to Notes Amounting to \$5,000.

Grave charges have been made against W. W. Keyes, general manager of the W. W. & R. M. Keyes Co., of Stratford. He is missing from Bridgeport, and from his home in Stratford, and is accused of forging the name of Judge Andrew Selleck, his father-in-law, to about \$5,000 worth of commercial paper, now in the hands of Marsh, Merwin & Lemon, of Bridgeport, with whom the firm kept its funds.

The W. W. & R. M. Keyes Co. is the outgrowth of the old De Oxidized Metal company. It was organized three or four years ago and its factory is located on Bruce avenue north of the railroad, east of Bruce's brook and just across the Stratford line. Judge Andrew Selleck, father-in-law of W. W. Keyes, was president of the concern, he became general manager and his brother, R. Melvil Keyes, was chosen secretary and treasurer.

It appears that recently the concern became rather embarrassed, it is alleged, by the conduct of its general manager. An investigation was at once commenced when he suddenly disappeared and has not since been seen. But the investigation revealed a truly wonderful state of affairs which made things look exceedingly bad for the missing man. Notes drawn by him and endorsed by Judge Selleck were found to the amount of \$5,000 and were in the hands of Marsh, Merwin & Lemon, the concern's bankers.

Upon examination the signature of Judge Selleck was pronounced fraudulent and it was discovered that the money raised on the notes had been converted to his own use by Young Keyes. He left no traces as to the place to which he fled though his friends assert that he has only gone away on business and will explain things upon his return.

Creditors of the company, however, take an entirely different view of the matter and believe that he has left for good and all. William McVoy and Joseph Flynn, two employees, attached

the company's property Wednesday morning for \$150 each for wages, while William Blight, father-in-law of R. M. Keyes, its secretary and treasurer, also placed an attachment for \$300 upon it.

Mr. Keyes is well known in Norwalk, having a few years ago married Miss Lillias, the only daughter of Judge Andrew Selleck, who formerly resided on Mott avenue, this city.

The Bridgeport Union has the following later report of the above case:

Mr. Keyes bade his wife good-bye on Monday and departed supposedly for his place of business. He went there and then disappeared. He failed to return Monday night. Tuesday evening Mrs. Keyes received a letter from him from New York in which he acknowledged forgeries extending over a period of eighteen months.

Judge Selleck, who has advanced his son-in-law many thousand dollars became suspicious of him on Saturday last. He had endorsed a note for \$300 given by Keyes. The note was held by the Fairfield County bank of this city. On Saturday Judge Selleck came to Norwalk and called at the bank and learned that the note had not been met although Keyes had told him that he had taken it up.

Marsh Merwin & Lemon, Bridgeport bankers, stated that a note for \$200 endorsed by Judge Selleck went to protest on Tuesday, and Mr. Selleck when shown the note said he had not endorsed it and that his signature was a forgery. They further stated that the amount of the notes would not reach \$5,000 as reported. Mrs. Keyes had also endorsed the notes. Judge Selleck told the Union reporter that Keyes had cost him \$15,000. He had endorsed his notes until eighteen months ago when he began forging. Mrs. Keyes said she was inclined to think that her husband had lost the money gambling on horses.

The Union further says that Keyes went to his wife and asked her to give him her diamond earrings and a diamond pin as he wanted to pawn them to get money to meet a bill. She willingly gave them to him and he pawned them in Bridgeport but did not give her the tickets. The Judge said that although Keyes had drawn upon him heavily, there was enough left for them to live upon.

When the Judge sold his house on Mott avenue, this city, the Union says Keyes got \$3,000 of the money. He also wanted \$1,500 but did not get it. Keyes is 36 years old and was a member of the First Presbyterian church.

It was not generally known that he gambled, but such is believed to be the fact, continues the Union. He has probably gone west.

So far forgeries to the amount of \$1,600 have been discovered. It is believed other forged notes will turn up as he professes to have been using forged paper for eighteen months.

Judge Selleck has about decided to wind up the affairs of the company, and will probably make application for a receiver soon. The affairs of the company are in a bad plight.
