PRACTICAL QUESTIONS SETTLED ABOUT THE CENTENNIAL EXHIBITION.

Castoria.

The word which heads our article seems to possess a charm. How much is expressed in this one word. For one man to say of another "I have confidence in him," is the greatest of recommendations. One that every one might be able to say of his neighbor. Confidence is the mainstay of society; without it and its soothing influence we should all drift into a state of barbarism, in which each being suspects the fellow being, and in which strength and might triumph over justice and right.

What would the business and trade of any country be without confidence? Very little; for without it business would be confined to very narrow limits. More especially will this apply to the business of this country than to most European countries. Here almost all business is done, in a measure, by one firm depending upon another; one firm being unable to stand wholly alone, but with accommodation and assistance from others it manages to live and prosper, and quite a profit is made for each one. A plan which we can see no possible objection to, providing each keeps its word and promise with the other. But confidence must be maintained or else the whole structure will fall to destruction like a cardboard house.

In foreign cities this plan prevails to a certain extent, but as it is more difficult for a man to start a business there than it is here, more difficult because a man must have quite a capital in the beginning, it follows that he does not require so much help from his neighbors.

If one man fails to meet his obligations strictly, honestly and honorably, it places his neighbor in a peculiar situation, compelling the latter either to ruin himself to meet his obligations honestly, or dishonestly to turn upon them upon the next one. He had better by far adopt the former method and ruin himself rather than ruin his neighbor; he should be sure to do everything that will allow a blessing to settle upon his credit, yes, better lay down upon the hard, bare floor and go to sleep hungry than break his word, his promise. Whether it be his fault or not he had better pay every cent on the dollar that he owes, even if he pawn his coat to do it, rather than act dishonorably toward any one, or have the confidence placed in him thrown to the dogs. Honor and shame from no condition rise; set well your part, there all the honor lies. "To whom can riches give reprieve, and trust, content, or pleasure, but the good and just?" If a man acts in this manner, he will have plenty ready to start him afresh; for by this simple act of paying all his debts, he creates a character and a name worth double and treble what it was before. Good name is better than riches. We object to a man who tells us we all know will pay honorably. We did not say lawfully, we said honorably. And set your remark about a wide distance between the two; both seem alike, and on the surface both are alike. But one word means that a man may do whatever the law allows him to do, and the other means "do unto others as you would have them do unto you," do all that lies in your power to do, forget the means, but attempt at once, and do this shall never fail. As the psalmist says: "He that sweareth unto his neighbor, and disappointeth him, though it were to his own hindrance, shall be counted false, these things shall never fail."

The men whom we elect from the great body of our citizens, the chosen few, in whose hands are placed all our affairs and business, whether it be to make laws proper for society or to deal with foreign nations, certainly have the greatest confidence placed in them. We surrender up, for a time, all our rights to interfere or disturb them in whatever they wish to do. And now have they acted wisely? As fraternal friends, swindle after swindle, theft after theft has come to light we see how they have abused their power. Our confidence in these men has been betrayed, and can never be replaced. Shame upon them that they should so abuse their trust. Do we place our check-book, our ledgers and our private accounts in the hands of anyone, unless we have great confidence in him? We choose one man out of hundreds and place him at the head, in doing this it is as much as saying "look my friends and neighbors, this is a man whom we can trust; he will, hereafter, represent us, whatever he does we will be responsible for." Now suppose this man commits a crime, and boldly, openly and with a smiling face draws checks and spends the money or gives it to his friends—does all this with but a slight attempt at concealment, we are obliged to endorse his actions but will we place the trust in him again? Confidence in social life is of great importance, and of great value to the individual; if it were to be so, it would be the wisest and our pleasure would be materially lessened, and our trials and burdens would be so increased that but few would be willing to live long. Perfect contentment and heart's ease is the result of confidence. We rest quietly and peacefully in the knowledge that those who have our confidence will be true to their promise. Some people, if they have the option of doing one of two things, will almost always do that which will benefit themselves the most; while others we know will act exactly contrary to this. The latter is far preferable, and if we all were to do more than we do society as a whole would be benefited; and when the former prevails to a great extent, farwell the tranquil mind, farwell contentment, and farwell all hope for a moment think how you would feel if you were obliged to say "I have confidence in no one." You can form no true idea of the misery which this will bring upon you, unless you have felt its power. Independence is a myth and a shadow; none of us are independent, but by comparison, we all lean more or less upon the support of others; it is by nature so. And if we feel secure in the hand that helps us, our life's difficulties then, and only then, confidence enters our hearts. Where doubt is confidence can never be. If there were no confidence society would cease to exist; for the root of society, the family, would be destroyed.

But confidence, although such a powerful agent in our lives, is often broken seldom repaired. There can be nothing half way in this matter; either all or none. Every one from his own experience can testify to this. One of the first rules of our life should be never to promise without due consideration; but once having promised to be true and loyal to our word. If this were the case more than half of the troubles of this world—business or social—would cease, and broken hearts and disappointed hopes so common in society would be no more. What grandeur there is in the confidence nature of the child. And how often we are deceived by the world do this confidence leave him. A child believes all things, hopes all things. Let our daily prayer then be that the confidence reported in us may never be broken, and that those dear ones whose hearts beat but for us may never have cause to say, with a bitter sigh, "I have no confidence in him; he deceived me once and he may again."
