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STATE NEWS.

A male bad weighing seven pounds and two ounces was caught at Saybrook.

The subscriptions to the Waterbury soldiers' monument fund now amount to nearly \$16,000.

Charles R. Shaw is under arrest in Waterbury on eight charges of selling lottery tickets.

John Sutcliffe, a New Haven lad has run away with the \$138 his father entrusted to him to deposit.

About 10,000 copies of the "Hills and Homes of Berkshire" have been distributed by the Housatonic railroad company.

The Willimantic Thread company has substituted a flock of sheep for lawn mowers, to keep the lawns about the factories in good condition.

Mr. and Mrs. Eliza Sanford of Plainville celebrated their sixtieth anniversary of marriage the other day. Their three children were present. There has been no death in their family for sixty years.

Levy, the embelizing treasurer of the Housatonic Railroad, who was arrested in West Virginia a few days ago, has been brought to Bridgeport for trial.

The gross earnings of the New York and New England railroad for the month of May were \$215,221, or \$11,700 more than for the corresponding month last year.

There are swarms of potato bugs in the south. A vessel which arrived at New London Monday had its rope fenders literally covered with the insects.

The chimney of an old and untenanted house in Norwich was smoked out recently, with fatal results to the swallows, several hundred of which were killed.

The little son of Postmaster Fox, of West Woodstock, fell under a field roller recently, and his hip was dislocated and broken at the socket, crippling him for life.

Judge Hoey, in the superior court now in session, has ruled that all accounts, loans, book debts, notes, etc., due between July 1874 and April 1877, will carry seven per cent interest until paid.

The mother of Walker, the suicide, denies that he had been rejected by the girl "Lena," and says that the latter was anxiously awaiting Walker's return when news of his death was brought to her.

In New London a three-months old pig which weighed two ounces at birth, and now weighs only two pounds. It follows its owner after the manner of a trained dog. Farmers' agents have offered \$200 for it, but the owner will not sell.

The Norwich stand-out company has discharged the forty prominent men among the striking dock hands of its steamboats, and has also granted the demand of \$100,000 per month to the others.

During April a meeting gave the American Home Mission Society \$11,629.77, which is the largest sum that has ever been given in one month by any state in the Union.

The Spiritualists of this state are contemplating raising the sum of \$1000 for the purchase of a camp meeting ground at Niantic, being dislocated with the present one at Lake Umbagog, Massachusetts.

An important suit but gently argued in court, won the heart of a rich Boston widow, and she advanced him money to buy a wedding outfit. Now she wishes she hadn't, for he has gone to the uttermost parts of the earth, leaving her to mourn bright hopes and betray'd affections.

Recently a boy found a box floating in the harbor at New Bedford. The box was opened and was found to contain the body of a baby who had evidently been strangled, the cord still remaining about its neck. Who the mother was probably never is ascertained by the authorities.

James Campbell, who was little better than a tramp when he arrived at Wallingford three years ago, has gone to Scotland to receive \$25,000, his share of his dead father's estate. He will come back to Wallingford, build a fine house and live in style.

A prisoner before the superior court at Norwich said in answer to an inquiry by the state attorney as to why he had beaten his wife, that he had been deceived by the angel Gabriel with whom he was in constant communication. Inevitably being apparent, the prisoner, Charles Mearns, a Salem farmer, was sent to the insane hospital.

During the parade of the Barnum and London shows in Salem, Mass., the six-horse team drawing the glass-enclosed cage containing forty big serpents became unmanageable and ran away, smashing the cage into fragments, and literally straggling the streets with anacondas, boa constrictors, and venomous reptiles. There was a general stampede among the immense crowd witnessing the procession, but through the coöperation of the keeper of the serpents, aided by the courage of the employees of the show, the slimy monsters were gathered up without harming any one.

About fifty colored men arrived in Ansonia Thursday, coming from Washington to be employed in Wallace Brothers' Brass Foundry. The firm, which is to employ these men sent a special agent to Washington to engage them and two other large firms in the lower part of the Naugatuck Valley to obtain employes in the same way. An agent for one of these establishments is now in Washington, and before many days another large delegation will arrive. Several colored female domestics have also arrived in Ansonia from Washington, many of the Ansonia people having made up their minds to employ black servants.

In the national convention of German athletes at St. Louis, last week, in which Connecticut was represented by seven members of the Turn Verein, there were over 1,500 contestants for prizes. There were but about fifty prizes, and while Connecticut's representatives were well trained, their chances of success were necessarily few in so large a gathering. They have, however, made a surprising creditable showing and two of their number brought home prizes with them. Charles Bucholz of New Haven, won the second prize in club swinging, and Louis Brock of Bridgeport, returns with the third prize for climbing. The latter climbed a smooth pole a distance of forty feet and the winner of the first prize climbed but five feet higher.

The Forthcoming Census Maps.

The maps connected with the forthcoming census volumes will attract wide attention. Those which were published with the last census have only served as a basis for the map work now in progress. Not only will there be great improvement in execution, excellent as the last were, but their number will be increased at least tenfold. Many more subjects of census details will be treated in map form, and there will also be a great increase in the number of maps devoted to those subjects which were in part covered before. This increase will, however, only be in proportion to the great ground covered by the census upon which General Walker is now engaged. As is well known he has availed himself of the services of many specialists of note, who have been engaged upon the particular subjects with which they are familiar. Thus topographical and meteorological matters, railroads, forestry, the various agricultural features, wealth, debt and kindred subjects, mining, vital statistics, and many other divisions are in charge of skilled men. Each of these subjects in all their details will be spread out for the eye. On the new maps the topographical features of the country will be more clearly represented than in any maps yet printed. The results of all the great surveys will be brought out and upon maps showing the elevations of the surface above the sea, and upon others presenting the alluvial and various upland divisions. Details of population and of climate will be set forth. These maps will be a quarto, or double the page of the census volumes, and each of the latter will be profusely illustrated with them. There will be, besides, the folio map similar in size to the one of the last census, showing probable containing more than double the number of charts and plates.

Where in the last census chapters only were given to certain subjects, there will now be entire chapters. The subjects of forestry, for instance, and cotton, will each fill a volume. So of some branches of wealth, debt, taxation, etc. The maps upon each head will be increased in proportion to the additions to the text. The important and interesting showing made by the one quarto map on forestry, one only for the entire country, will be remembered by all familiar with the work of the last census. Now there will be a map of woodland for each state, and these individual maps each give facts of forestry in great detail. The cotton states will each have a map, and some of them two, to set forth with clearness the facts of this product. So of all agricultural staples, mining, railroads, and vital statistics, all will be treated exhaustively. Upon the topographical maps, population, crops, disease, and meteorological variations will be given according to the general divisions of the soil, alluvial upland, etc.

The map features of the last census was now made up of two to illustrate to the eye some of the subject divisions of the census statistics as they were gathered without special reference to map work. In the present census much of the work has been done with special reference to map delineations. The whole will, therefore, be much more comprehensive. While this feature contains a large addition to the text, no part of the money expended will afford so good a means of my presenting a general knowledge of the country upon all who examine the census volumes. As to reference books in schools, colleges and libraries, these volumes and maps will be invaluable.

Business Before Pleasure.

There is a sagacious Newfound dog in New York which will take the back of it in which is a rat, and get fat, vegetable, or whatever the note calls for, and carry it safely home. But he has a daily task assigned him which he performs, rain or shine, and that is to carry his mistress her dinner. She keeps a military establishment, and does not go home to her noon-day meal. Regularly as the day comes round the dog may be seen trotting along Main street at about 11, with the basket in his mouth, looking neither to the right nor left, but straight to the store, where he sets it down and waits until his mistress comes for it. New Flour.

Brown corn is likely at no distant day to revolutionize the bread-stuff supply of the world. A process has been discovered by which the finest and most delicious flour can be made from the seed to the extent of one-half its weight, and leave the other half a valuable food for making beef and milk. The average yield per acre is three hundred bushels, and in many instances five hundred bushels, or thirty thousand pounds, have been secured. Nor does it exhaust the soil as Indian corn, from the fact that it feeds from the deeper soil, and assimilates its food from a cruder state. It belongs to the same genus as the sweet cane, commonly known as sorghum, which as an article of food is growing rapidly in public esteem, and from the seed of which a most nutritious flour can be obtained.

A Telescope Story.

The San Francisco Call tells an extraordinary story respecting a monster telescope made by Profs. Lefevre and Long, French scientists, and erected at San Francisco. The lenses are twenty feet in diameter, and this is what happened when the astronomers and their friends turned the instrument to the heavens: "M. Lefevre was the first to apply his eye to the eye-piece of the telescope. For fully five minutes he looked on in speechless amazement, then, without a word, turned away to hide his emotion. One by one the gentlemen present tested the telescope, exhibiting their astonishment in various ways. The planet which happened to be in its beams upon the great speculum was Mars, and the revelation is to wonder and credit. The eye-piece of the low magnifying power was first placed on, when the planet presented a most astounding sight. The powerful lens brought the surface of the planet nearer than that of the moon has ever been brought by the most powerful telescope. The green of the sea was brought out in unmistakable colors, and one could almost imagine that he could see the waves upon the surface. There before the eye was spread out a splendid panorama of hill and dale; dark patches that must be covered by forests, great yellowish patches that looked like autumn fields, silvery threads that must be rivers, and several unmistakable volcanoes in action." It was also discovered by means of a photographic arrangement, that Mars is thickly populated, the houses and even the people being visible.

Some Fish Stories.

The Maine schooner, Maud Muller, took 127,000 pounds of fish in eight weeks. In Lake George, Fred E. Ringer took a salmon trout weighing fifteen pounds. Griffith Shannon caught 119 trout in the mountain streams near Altoona, Pa. T. R. Lumsden of Tallbottom, Ga., caught recently a trout weighing four pounds. He also hooked a fourteen-pound buffalo fish. A Georgia paper says that there are enough alligators in Lake Marion, Polk County, to fence in the entire county, ten alligators high. A trap net on the north shore of Onondaga Lake was captured by Game Constable Lansley, and found to contain 200 pounds of pike and pickerel and 500 bullheads. Twenty black bass, weighing over 70 pounds, were caught recently in the mouth of Niagara River by David Miller and G. P. Hosmer. They weighed from 2 1/2 to 4 pounds each. The Delaware River is a favorite bass stream. Black bass fishing opened June 1st. Over 15,000 of these fish were taken with hook and line between Milford and Narrowsburg, last season. George E. Cook and his son took the prize mess of trout in a Sullivan County, New York, brook, the exact location of which they refuse to divulge. In a few hours they took 119 handsome fish. Mr. Cook took 106 and his son 13.
